Alaska	Yes	No	Retailers register to ship by written order.
Arkansas	No	No	ABC Reg. 3.19(6) prohibits delivery by retailer.
Arizona	Yes	Yes	Through three tier system.
California	Yes	Yes	Proof of age and records of deliveries required.
Colorado	Yes	Yes	Retail liquor stores with delivery permit. In-state wineries, yes ONLY if consumer has visited the winery.
Connecticut	Yes	No	Delivery by licensed retailer or licensed transporter.

District of Columbia	Yes	Yes	No public or common carrier shall transport or bring into the District of Columbia wine, spirits, or beer in a quantity in excess of one quart in any one calendar month for delivery to any one person in the District under a Manufacturer, or Wholesaler or retailer's license.
Florida	Yes	No	(Section 561.57, Fla. Stat.) Deliveries made by vendors away from his or her place of business may be made only in vehicles that are owned or leased by the licensee.
Georgia	No	No	Unless consumer is physically present on the winery premise, then, winery can ship up to 5 cases to any one consumer in Georgia in any calendar year.
Hawaii		Yes	281-33.5 Reciprocal shipment, effective July 1, 2001.
Illinois	No		Law prohibits shipment of alcohol to consumers from points outside state, limited exception for the purchase of wine from manufacturers in states with reciprocal wine agreement with IL. Manufacturers in states such as CA and OR may ship max of 2 cases of wine, with 9 bottles each directly to IL consumer each year. In-state winery, yes, does not prohibit shipment of alcohol to consumers that originate within the state, so long as each shipment are by a licensed Illinois retailer, or by a common carrier employed by one. Package must clearly state they contain alcohol, and delivery must be signed by a person at least 21.
Indiana	No	No	Retailers may deliver but not ship.

Kentucky	No	Yes	Only if consumer has visited winery.
Louisiana	No	Yes	Must be a native winery licensed under R.S. 28:325
Maryland	Yes	No	By retailers, only to consumers in licensed jurisdiction with permission of local liquor board.

Minnesota	Yes	Yes	Domestic wineries only. 2 cases per year, only from state with reciprocity with Minnesota wines.
Missouri	Yes	Yes	Must be domestic winery licensed under 311.190 RSMO.
Nebraska	Yes	Yes	A \$500 shipping license is required for any person who sells and ships alcoholic liquors from another state directly to a consumer in this state. The holder of the license pays the required excises tax on or before 12/31 of each calendar year. Residents of Nebraska are limited to a quantity not to exceed 9 liters in any one calendar month.
Nevada	Yes	No	Must go through three-tier system. Direct shipment to consumer from out-of-state registered suppliers, 12 cases/year wine, 1 gallon/month limit all other liquors, NRS 369.450

New York	Yes	Yes	As long as they have appropriate license and comply with all provisions of the ABC law.

Rhode Island	Yes		An unlicensed person for personal use may no more than 5 times per year no more than 6 gallons for malt beverages or 3 gallons from vinous beverages or spirits.

Texas	Yes	Yes	Certain limitations determined by type of permit. In state wineries may ship to the purchaser's residence if the purchase is made at the winery. If placed by phone or other manner, it may be shipped to the nearest package store for customer pickup.
